

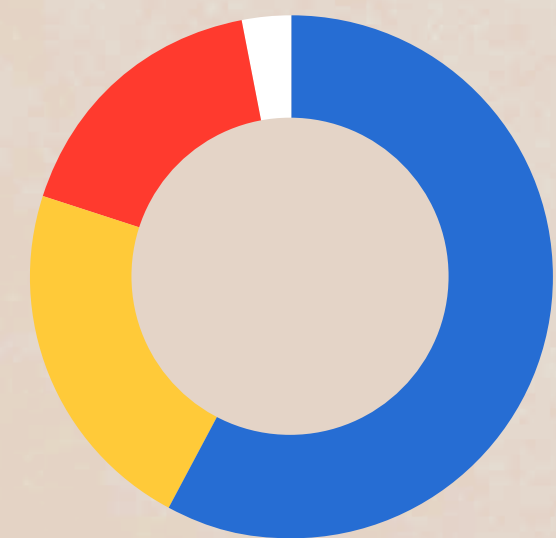
Opinions of French, Spanish and Portuguese people about bullfighting

- 3% I don't know

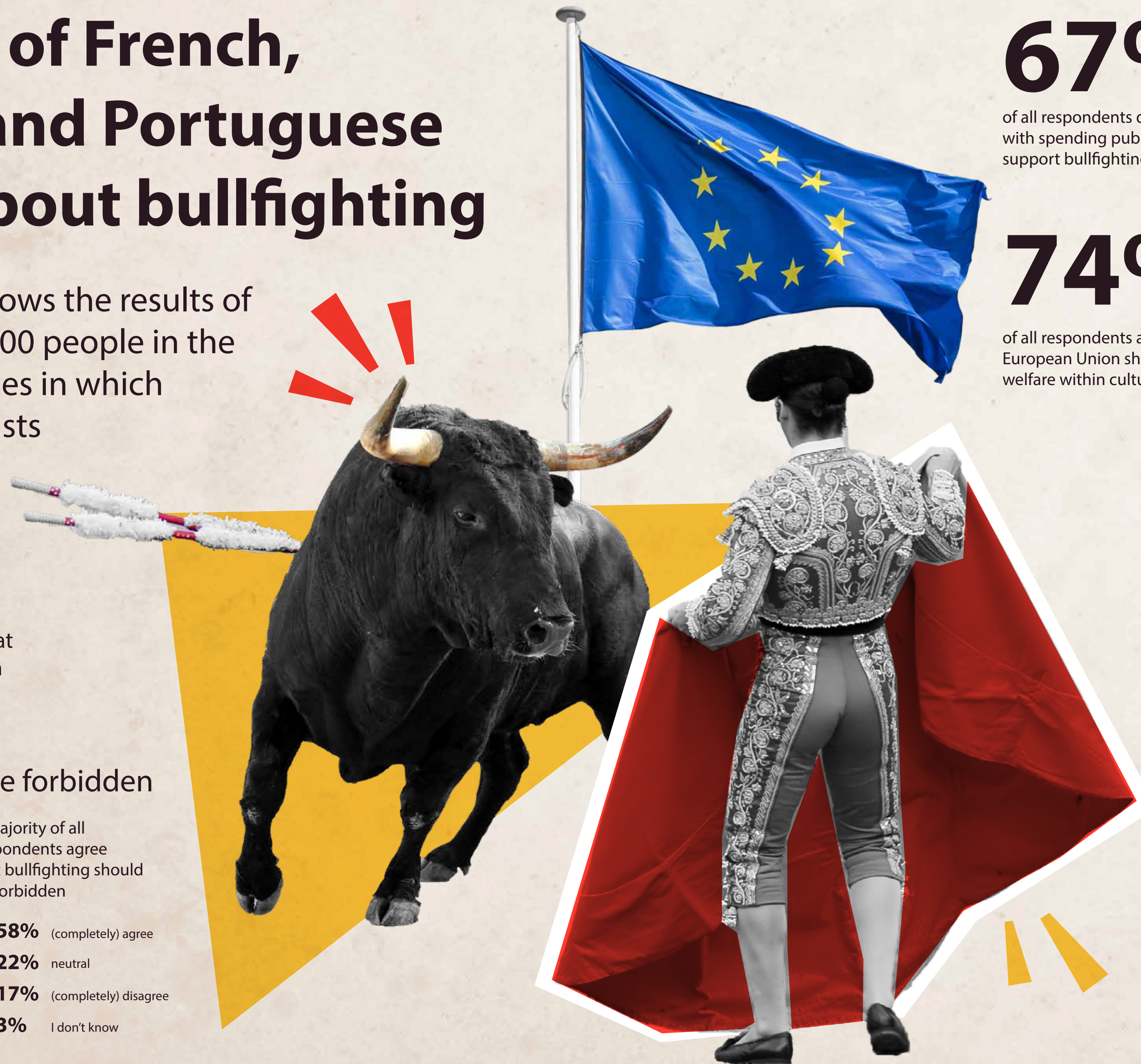
French and Portuguese people agree more often than Spanish people

of all respondents agree that the European Union should protect animal welfare within cultural traditions

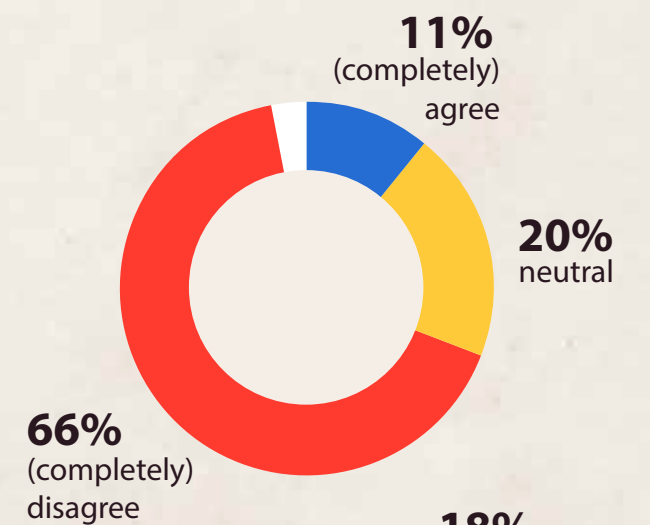
French and Portuguese people disagree more often than Spanish people



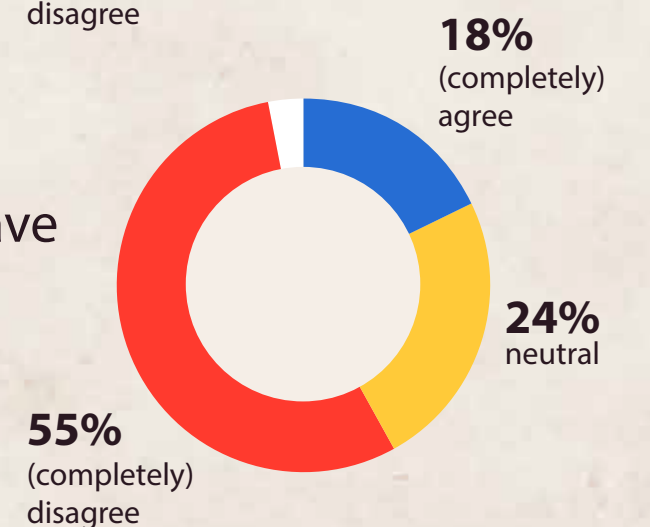
Portuguese respondents agree more often with this statement



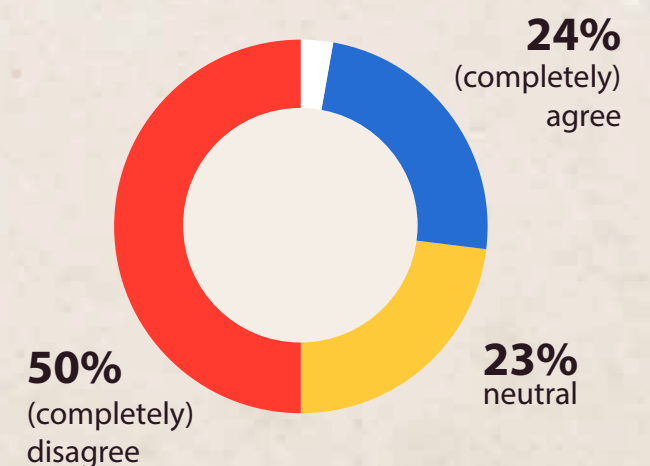
I consider bullfighting an enjoyable practice

Online survey in the Ipsos I&O Public Online Access Panel from 20 March till 3 April 2024, duration of the survey was on average 3 minutes.

Sample

Representativeness is guaranteed by drawing a stratified sample, setting quotas during fieldwork and applying weighting corrections to the data. The sample is representative for each of the countries in terms of gender, age, education level and region. Respondents are 18 years or older.
